Alternative Text Guidelines

- All images need alt text.
- Alt text should refer to relevant content provided by the image, rather than simply describing how the image looks.
- Alt text should not contain any extra or unnecessary information, and should not repeat information that is already provided in the text of the document or website.
- Do not start with “image of” or “picture of”.
- Avoid images with text, but if necessary only include words in the image in the alt text.
- Be concise, 125-150 characters or under is ideal.
- Use proper capitalization and punctuation. End alt text with appropriate punctuation.
- For decorative images use null alt text attribute (alt=" ") by hitting the spacebar once, or check the “decorative image” option in rich content editors if available.
- For complex images provide a short description in the alt text and separately link to a long description in a detailed accessible text document or accessible data table.
- Alt text must be in the same language as the main content.
- Do not stuff alt text with keywords to promote search engine optimization (SEO).
